Contributing to People and Society That's the Philosophy of Kawasaki's Business Activities

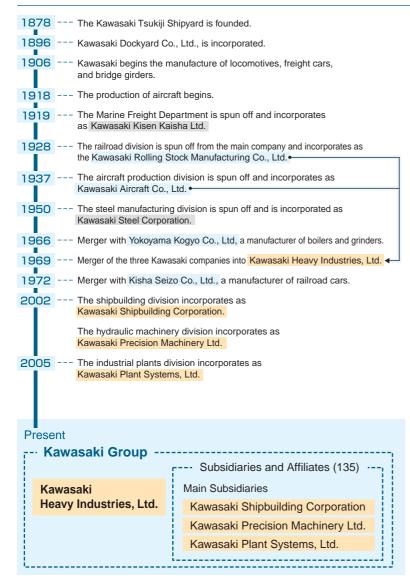
